It is made to show theatre / **performance** by **DDN** people.

DDN is short for:

- Deaf / deaf
- disabled
- neurodivergent.








Neurodivergent people have brains that work differently from most other people in lots of different ways.

Neurodivergent includes people who:

- have ADHD.

The things in this part of the Easy Read are our goals.




Goals are things we want to make happen.

Opportunities are when you get the chance to be part of something.




Our goals are also to:

- offer workshops to DDN performers that are
 - o accessible
 - o relevant



- support DDN performers / creatives to:
 - o learn to do new things
 - o present / perform their work







Relevant means they are a good fit for what people need.

Another goal is to **lead by example**.



Leading by example means doing things the right way not just telling other people to do them.



For us this means:

- keeping intersectionality at the centre of our work
- making sure we include everyone



working in a way that fits with human rights.



Here intersectionality means understanding that things are not the same for all DDN people.



Things are different for people who are also in other groups like:







Transgender people are people who have a different gender to the one people thought they had when they were born.



Human rights are the basic rights everyone has like:

- having a safe place to live
- being able to say what you think.









We think about things like:

- the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities
- Nothing About Us Without Us.

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with

Disabilities is a law lots of countries have agreed to.

It says what governments must do to make sure disabled people get the same rights as everybody else.



Nothing About Us Without Us is a saying that has been used in disability rights for a long time.

It means disabled people:



- should be part of making any decisions that affect them
- not have decisions made about them by people who are not disabled.



We make sure accessibility is at the centre of everything we do.



We do our best for everyone who is part of the festival.



We respect:

- the limits people have
- the different things people need.



We **contract** DDN people when we can.




Contract means paying them money to do things we need.
